A Module	You can speak to your <u>module convener, lecturer, or seminar leader</u> in their feedback and consultation hours or contact them by email for questions and concerns about module content or delivery.
	You can give anonymous feedback in your Mid-Term Module Evaluations and End-of-Term Module Evaluations.

	You can get advice from the <u>Department ASK Advisor</u> , who can provide assistance with assignment, exams, and
	coursework.
	You can speak to your <u>Academic Tutor</u> about general concerns relating to a module or if you're unsure who you should speak to. Don't forget, you will meet your Academic Tutor at least once a term, but you can contact them any time if you have concerns or questions.
	You can speak to the <u>Department Director of Teaching and Learning</u> .
	You can contact your <u>Student Rep</u> , who can pass along feedback to staff in your department.
My Academic Performance	If you are feeling concerned about your academic performance, please speak to your <u>Academic Tutor</u> . You can also contact individual module conveners, lecturers, or seminar leaders for issues in a particular module.
	There are also numerous sources of academic support available to you including the <u>Department ASK Advisor</u> , <u>Study Advice</u> ( <u>studyadvice@reading.ac.uk</u> ), <u>Maths Support</u> ( <u>mathssupport@reading.ac.uk</u> ), <u>Academic Liaison Librarians</u> for help with information skills including referencing and finding sources.
An Extension on Coursework or Suspension	You can submit an Exceptional Circumstances Form on RISIS. You will need to provide evidence.
or Withdrawal	If you are unsure what kind of evidence is sufficient, whether you meet the eligibility, or are unclear on the timing and process, you can contact the <u>Department Director for Academic Tutoring</u> .
	If you are considering suspending your studies or withdrawing from your programme, please speak to your <u>Academic Tutor</u> . You should also contact the <u>Support Centre</u> through the Ask a Question function on RISIS or on 0118 378 4243.
	Your dedicated Support Centre is based in the Edith Morley building, and if you wish to speak to a Student Support Coordinator in person the front desk is open from 10am to 12pm and then from 1pm to 5pm Monday to Friday.
